Member Story – Don Dickinson A Textbook Love Affair

In my first job out of college in 1968, my boss was an Alfisti (an Alfa Romeo enthusiast) with a Giulietta Spider and a Sprint Special. I had no idea what an Alfa Romeo was, but seeing those beautiful cars was intriguing, especially since I have some Italian blood on my mother's side. Following his invitation, I got involved in the Portland, Oregon Alfa owners club and became the first editor of Alfa Bits, the club newsletter that continues to this day.

Over the next few years I owned two Alfas, a very rare 1959 Giulietta Sprint Coupe and a 4-door Giulia Super.

Fast forward to 1998 when I sold my interest in my advertising agency and accepted a teaching position in the Portland State University School of Business.

Over the next 15 year at PSU I started writing textbooks because I could not find any books that I thought were worth the student's money.

When I fully retired in 2012, it was time to fulfill a dream of owning a round-tail spider. Coincidently the royalties from my textbooks were starting to actually amount to something. It took two years of searching before I found what seemed to be a good candidate that was at least a 3.0 on the *Classic Car Condition Rating Guide*.

The car was owned by a small-time collector in Burbank CA who did not have room for it. He wanted \$33,000. I met him at Auto Week where he was selling a couple of cars and he agreed to negotiate on the price, but only if I came to Burbank and personally inspected the car. So, I flew in

to John Wayne airport in April of 2014 and found the car to be as advertised. Then the negotiations started.

I told him my whole Alfa story, how I had dreamed of this car for years and how I was only able to pay what I had saved in textbook royalties. This dollar limit of under \$30,000, I specified, must also include the cost of my airfare and the cost to trailer the car back to Cornville. He ultimately agreed.

My Alfa, in its beautiful
Pininfarina Red, was built in
Milan in May of 1969. I know
it was sold new by a dealer in
New Jersey, but the
provenance after that is scant
until the Burbank owner.
Since it has no rust, it is quite
likely that it has been a dry
weather car for its entire life.

I've had the car since 2014, and have very much enjoyed

doing small things to it to easily bring it closer to a 4.0 rating. It has appeared in three SCC delegations at the Sedona St. Patrick's Day Parade and the October airport show. It's a reliable driver, gets a lot of looks and performs well, in spite of its age.

I continue to write advertising textbooks and as I reflect back on this whole history, it makes me smile how I typed stuff into my computer and out pops a beautiful "coda tonda" which, according to Bohnam's Auction House, is Italian for "round tail." Hope you enjoyed my textbook love affair.
